

LEARNING

Parents are critical partners in student learning, as you are your child's first teacher. To help support your child at home you can ask these five questions (Sharrat: 2019):

- 1. What did you learn today?
- 2. -ow did you do?
- 3. What would you do if you didn't understand?
- 4. ow can you improve your learning?
- 5. What are you most proud of?

These questions are open ended and allow learners to reflect on what they have done at school during the day and create opportunities for you to have informative conversations with your child.

At St Joseph's, teachers have similar questions that we ask the students to help gain understanding of student learning.
